From the Editor

My Dear Brothers and Sisters:

As we approach Pentecost (May 31st this year), a festival of Community, of the Free Individuality, of the Future and of the Will, we recall the image of fiery tongues hovering above the individualities of the Disciples. Of this Rudolf Steiner has written: "Just as each one of the disciples received the Christ Impulse into themselves, just as it was granted to them to receive it in the form of tongues of fire inspiring their own souls, so can you men, all of you, if you bestir yourselves to understand the Christ Impulse, receive its power, individualized, into your own hearts, the power which can develop in you ever more and more, which can become for you ever more and more complete. – An all-embracing hope can well forth for us out of this sign, which was thus set at the starting point of Christianity. The more a man perfects himself, the more he can feel that the Holy Spirit speaks out of his own inner being, in the measure that his thinking, feeling and willing are permeated by this Holy Spirit, which through its manifold division is also an individual Spirit in each single human individuality in which it works." ("Whitsun: The Festival of the Free Individuality" by Rudolf Steiner - Hamburg, Whitsunday, 1910)

Judith von Halle tells us that the tongues of flame were also "a symbol for the seed of the phantom body. In these ten days, the first Resurrection body replicated itself and on the tenth day it was possible, for the first time on the entire evolution of the Earth, for a human being to put on this seed of the phantom body, this 'drop of salt water' meant specifically for him." (*And If He Has Not Been Raised*, 160-161) When this fire came upon them, the disciples "had a vision of the future evolution of humanity, namely that they would carry this fire impulse into their next incarnation". (162) As they looked at one another, the feeling came over them that "I and the other person are individuals, but we are both united with one another and with the other fire-bearers; we are perfectly at one through the immense unifying power of the Sun, which is now to

be found on the Earth. Everything in us strives towards the One and this unites us in truth. It is no longer the blood which welds us together, but this Source of the Spirit, the universal, Divine and single source of human selfhood....This community of brothers was born at the time of Christ and is the community of the future, which is able to withstand the counterimpulse which has arisen and will arise through the individualization of human beings: egoism, materialism.” (163)

It is important that we apply this message to our lives, i.e. respecting the Other as an individual who has different perceptions, ideas, opinions, spiritual practices and beliefs than our own, and yet we share the same unifying principle – that of the Christ and Anthroposophia. I am reminded of this by a situation in our community that has caused some divisive feelings. I am referring to the fact that a few people have approached me at different times and indicated their disapproval of the printing of certain announcements in our newsletter, specifically regarding the upcoming Robert Powell Conference and the Christian Community events.

First of all, we need to remind ourselves that many streams, not just one, comprise the Anthroposophical Movement. This reason alone will give us all many different points of view, interests and spiritual practices. Secondly, we must recall the history of the Anthroposophical Society and how its two main spiritual streams have not had such a great start in working together. Steiner begged the members shortly before his death to please be as “brothers and sisters” to one another. He said that the very future of earth civilization depends of the cooperation between the two streams (Aristotleans and Platonists) and their bringing to earth a new culture. He confided in those close to him that the terrible illness he bore at the end of his life, which greatly shortened his life and left so much work unfinished, was a consequence of the negative Karma between the two groups, which he had taken on himself. Steiner foresaw the difficulties that would transpire after his death and warned Ita Wegman that she would suffer because of this (she was forced to leave the Society, in case any of you do not know this), but he also told her that “next time things will be better”. Next time is *now*. Are we striving to make things better? All over the Anthroposophical Society there are signs of new enthusiasm and initiatives. Ahriman is of course furious about this and is trying his best to wreak havoc and discord among our members – his very future depends upon our success or failure.

If we feel that a member or even a highly charismatic anthroposophical speaker is in error, what is the Christ-like way to handle it? The worst thing one can do is to tell a person he is “totally wrong” and you are “absolutely right”. That is very alienating and such behavior is one of the main reasons our Society has not grown as much as it should have. It reminds one of the Inquisition. There would be a lot less factions in the Society if Prokofiev had simply invited Robert Powell to tea and pastries and told him that he had some difficulty understanding the writings of Tomberg, and would he be so kind as to explain what he meant by certain seemingly negative statements. But since he chose instead to write two books condemning Tomberg, it would be helpful if Powell would respond to the accusations because otherwise it leaves a lot of us confused. There is no harm in self-defense. Rudolf Steiner gave a number of lectures about a terrible situation in which a mentally unbalanced woman claimed that Steiner had led her on romantically and she was furiously angry over his marriage to Marie. It turns out that she merely *dreamt* that he told her she was the one for him, but she twisted his quote about one’s dream life being more real than waking life by concluding that since she dreamt it, it must be true. Apparently, a number of members were angry with Steiner, having believed the woman until he set them straight.

One must also ask oneself – “How can you be so sure that you are the one who is correct?” Even if one believes that he has had spiritual revelations in sleep or meditation, one must recall that when one is able to cross the Threshold, one meets far more demons disguised as Christ or Steiner than good Angels.

One must also remember to stick to the middle Path of equanimity, being ever watchful that one is neither too gullible nor too skeptical in matters of the Spirit. One should neither deify

nor demonize our fellow humans. Both can do equal harm. I know of lives that have been ruined by people who put too much faith in gurus. As Steiner told us, we should not “believe” anything he has said, but rather prove it to ourselves by our spiritual practice. We are all full of discarnate Beings “stuffed like maggots in cheese” as Steiner put it. An anthroposophist may write the most sublime spiritual books, but still be guilty of ahrimanic behavior toward his fellow man. No one is perfect. We all make mistakes. The more spiritually developed a person is, the more the ahrimanic and luciferic beings will try to destroy one. Even if I disagree with the philosophy some anthroposophist puts out, it is not my place to publicly condemn his work or refuse to acknowledge it. Even if I am correct in my assertion, I must still give others the freedom to find out for themselves. Sometimes it is in one’s Karma to get on a false path for a time. Much can be learned from it.

It also seems to be the case that many anthroposophists come to feel rejected or betrayed in some way by other members. I wonder if this isn’t some kind of test on the Path, a sort of “Betrayal by Judas” or a feeling of a “Prophet not being accepted in his own land”, because it seems to happen to so many and often to the most creative and spiritual people. It is tragic when some leave and don’t come back. Albert Steffen once said that “Anthroposophy must be saved from the Anthroposophists!” (And yet there are some who would have counted him in with the Anthroposophists we need saving from!) Please don’t throw out the Baby with the bathwater if this happens to you!

I hope that these words are not taken personally, because they are not aimed at any particular person. They may apply to all or none or even some of you; but I am not infallible and I strive not to judge. I do realize that we need to be on guard against false prophets, for Steiner has foretold that Ahriman will incarnate in our time and that even the most spiritual of people will be fooled, so we need to read carefully, observe our intuitions and even our physical reactions to people we hear and books that we read, and above all pray for guidance and protection in order that we will not be misled spiritually.

One must also keep the Big Picture in mind and not get bogged down by the differences in the dogmas and perceptions that we have. Does it really matter who Steiner and the Maitreya Buddha were in the past, are now or will be in the future? I am sure that if we gathered 10 anthroposophists in a room and asked them their thoughts on this, we would get 10 different opinions. Steiner warned us about speculations. Ahriman loves to cause confusion by giving us each a different idea about such trivia. What is important right now is saving the planet. If we don’t get our act together, we will face the graveyard of civilization.

Another thought we must bear in mind is that Steiner has repeatedly said that it is good for there to be differences of opinion. It helps us grow. When we are in a room of people who are all in agreement, we go to sleep! There are 12 points of view to every issue, he says, and it behooves us to try to understand as many of them as we can.

I want each and every member of the community to feel supported in his/her work, whether it is a conference, research, a new book they have written, a yard sale or pig pickin they are having, or if they are going through some crisis in their lives. There are not enough hours in the day for us to support each and every endeavor with our time, energy and money, but at least we can give them the space in the newsletter to call on like-minded spirits to join them and we can hold our members and their endeavors in our consciousness with thoughts of Light.

And so in the spirit of Pentecost, let us recall our united mission as Servants of Michael and Christ, and feel love and respect for one another’s individual initiatives.

A Letter from Patrick Kennedy to the North Carolina Christian Community:

(Reverend Patrick Kennedy was unable to come to NC in March for his planned visit in order to accompany a member of the Baltimore/Greater DC Christian Community who was preparing to pass over the threshold. He sent this letter to us, which we would like to share with you):

Dear North Carolina Community,
Dear Friends in Christ,

I send you my warmest greetings and must confess to the sadness that I could not see you this weekend. A dear soul in our community - a 91 year-old Air-Force colonel and regular attendee of the service, Clyde "Chip" Bergwin - has been consciously and slowly dying of old-age.

Accompanying him and his daughter has been a life blessing, as many of you know such time can be from personal experience. It is the first time I have been with someone who is not dying from any medical complication, sickness, or injury, but simply because it is time to lay aside what had become his home during the last century: his body. There is always a sadness at leaving home, and he does feel this loss as well as the loss of seeing his devoted daughter, Lark Bergwin-Anderson, whom some of you know. Yet, as he told me yesterday, he is ready.

One can palpably feel that the death on our side of the veil is a birth into his *spirit-home*.

Walking with him day by day towards this birth has been truly wonder-filled. With each step he takes towards that day, the mood of sacredness in the room increases and one can't but help feeling blessed in his presence. And that he has been doing this awake, conscious of what is taking place, readying himself, brings the free element of his humanity into the stark necessity of death. As he himself has said, *he* is dying. Death is not simply coming to take him, he is also knowingly come to meet it, inwardly upright, still with a great sense of humor and full of overwhelming gratitude for God's gift of life and the people he has known.

To do this with him at the start of Passiontide leads in such a real way to the meaning and fullness of the mystery of the Cross. When we turn our attention to Holy Week and Good Friday, we behold the heart of the Divine Ground of All Being, the Creator Spirit of overflowing life, walking willingly and consciously into death, letting it into him, with all the enormous power of his empathetic being, so that his very being *became a part of death*, turning the tragedy of death into the bringer of *true* meaning and life.

News from Tammy Hughes in China:

My work in the Beijing kindergarten is particularly busy, as I am continuing to train more and more teachers as the kindergarten plans to expand in the fall to meet the long waiting list. The new kindergarten could have 17 classrooms of fifteen children each! The kindergarten is not a Waldorf kindergarten, but I am able to train the teachers using Anthroposophical ideas and Waldorf methods. The teacher's interest to study is steadily growing. My work is really fascinating and challenging. I will be home in June, I look forward to having a chance to meet together.

In late March I went to visit a few places in order to reconnect with The Chengdu Waldorf School, visit new projects in Guangxi, and see the schools in Guangzhou. It was a quick, but enlivening trip. I would say that my overall impression of the trip was that people are really taking up their own inner development. I met with many friends who are steadily studying, attending talks, practicing what they are learning, and questioning themselves. Watching the development of the work in China is a very heartwarming experience. As teachers often say, "I am learning more from the students than they are from me"; I definitely find this true for myself in China.

My work in Chengdu was brief, but perhaps it interests you what happens when I go on a trip. I was fortunate that Johannes, a German Waldorf teacher who works with spiritual landscaping was in town. I was able to hear about his daily dot drawings of the earth that he is doing this year. I gave a talk to the new parents at the school where I answered many basic questions about sleep, eating and the curriculum. I watched a German class, a parent/child class and peeked into the kindergarten classes and met with the kindergarten teachers. I met with Whitney MacDonald, my son's former teacher and his son Asher, and took them around to a temple and shopping. (Dear friends when will you come!). I had a few meetings with teachers and friends.

In Guangxi, I went to look more at the possibilities in the future for Waldorf education or anthroposophy connecting to other people's work. I visited Qingping, which is a very small village near the beautiful limestone mountains in Guilin. In this village, a former very high power businesswoman, Guolin, who has had cancer is opening a Cancer Survivor Center. It is a big and beautiful project. She is open to the idea that people could use her center for conferences. She would like me to buy books that would help cancer survivors. Any one have any thoughts? Please let me know

.Also in Guangxi, I met three young women ,Ada, Li Fen, Mingping and the farmer Liuyibing; in the fall they had all come to the biodynamic conference in Guangzhou. The young women have been working for The Farmer's Friend, which is an organization which links farmers in the area with a restaurant and others needing organic products. Liuyibing is one of the farmers. It was great to have him show me his compost piles, see his enthusiasm for the richness of the soil, here is observation about bugs, and eat his fresh lettuce! The women are looking to start their own farm. These people have all been supported by my friend Zhuming, who has a great interest in biodynamics, anthroposophy and community development. (He plans to go to the Anthroposophical conference in Manilla, and then attend a biodynamic conference in the Don Bosco center in Davao. Previously I sold cloth; the profits of this cloth will support him.)

In Guangzhou, I had the great pleasure of attending a Biography and Initiative Development workshop given by Chris and Signe Schaeffer at the new building of the independent Waldorf Second grade. (Their new school is a converted horse stable!) While at the school, we dug up the cow horns which we had buried with Hans Mulder in the fall.

As I look forward to the work in China, I am very encouraged. Friends of Waldorf Education has continued to fund part of my travel. I am finding that I am able to create and organize workshops of value. I am enjoying the study of biodynamics with my Chinese friends.

And thank you to all my friends in the ASNC that have supported my work over the years. A special thanks to Mark for all the encouragement!

This week I am going to The Philippines Conference, I will have the rare pleasure of hearing a Class Lesson, (the seventh lesson).

DOUGLAS GERWIN TO SPEAK AT EWS MAY 1

This will be another great weekend with another Master Teacher. Please come if you can to hear Douglas Gerwin speak on "Waldorf Education -- And Who Shall Teach the Teachers?" In the national debate concerning religious practice in education, Waldorf schools often get caught in the crossfire. Sometimes they are charged with being too Christian, at other times with being too pagan. Again and again the schools are accused of practicing Christian rituals while downplaying, perhaps even denying, their Christian roots, for instance in the seasonal festivals. And yet, speaking at the assemblies of the first Waldorf school in Stuttgart, Germany, Rudolf Steiner repeatedly invoked the name of Christ as the guiding spirit of the school and the "teachers' greatest Teacher". To understand this statement, however, one needs to recall that Steiner insisted on complete unqualified freedom in matter of religious practice and felt "that the only true Christianity is the Christianity which makes possible absolute freedom in the religious life." Indeed, he predicted there would come a time when Christianity as it is commonly practiced today would pass away, but the central role of the Christ in helping people become more fully human would continue. In other words, when Rudolf Steiner invokes the Christ as the guiding spirit of the Waldorf schools, this is not a call to Christian worship nor is it an appeal to any sectarian

Christian doctrine. What is it, then? This is the question we will be exploring in a lecture open to the public on Friday evening, followed by discussion and artistic activity on Saturday for participants in Foundation Studies in Anthroposophy and the Arts culminating in the graduation of this cluster. Eastern Regional Council Holds Conference In Spring Valley With Various Local Groups

On Palm Sunday weekend (April 3-5), the Eastern Regional Council met in Spring Valley to confer with one another, as well as to share conversations with representatives from various mid-Atlantic groups, including The Threefold Branch, the New York City Branch, the Michaelic Group from Connecticut, The Youth Movement, the Planning Committee for the 2009 Annual General Meeting and with Barbara Renold to hear about the plans for the Mystery Drama Workshop in August. There was great enthusiasm in the exchanges and much that is being planned around the region in the coming year.

The ERC presently consists of Herbert Hagens of Princeton, NJ, Ed Scherer of Long Island, Ann Finucane of Washington D.C, Kathleen Wright of Durham, NC, who joined the Council in Spring 2008 and Ruth Bruns of Harlemlville, who joined in Fall 2008. One of the items of discussion amongst the ERC members was the possibility of adding two more members to the Council. The idea would be that instead of the entire Council visiting just one or two areas per year, the Council would travel by twos to areas close to them. This would save on travel expenses and enable more groups to be visited more frequently.

On Friday evening, ERC members formulated questions that they wished to discuss among themselves, as well as with the groups. Some of these included: What should be done in communities and in the General Society when factions arise over controversial individualities? What should a community do when members are giving more time and energy to daughter movements and little if any to the Society? What questions do we want to bring to the Spring Valley Communications Summit in May and the Three Regions Council meeting in the Fall? What branches have their own websites and what are they? What is happening with the Society's tax exempt number – how may groups use it? Should the ERC be contacting new members, and how can we obtain this information? How does our outreach work? How can we encourage friends of the Society to become dues-paying members? How are other groups going to be celebrating Michaelmas this year? How can we encourage groups to celebrate it early so that it does not conflict with the AGM, which is earlier this year than usual?

These questions, most of which concerned the ERC itself, were discussed throughout the weekend and a few of these were brought to the Saturday afternoon session with the 14 attendees. The conversation began with introductions, reports from the AGM Planning Committee, the Mystery Drama Group, and then from the various groups present.

Spring Valley will be bustling with activity from August through October beginning with a workshop with Gary Lamb on Social Transformation August 8-12. It will include an Art and Science exhibit featuring the work of Seth Wulsin and others. This will be immediately followed by the Mystery Drama Conference August 12-16.

. Barbara Renold, who will be directing both Steiner's *Portal of Initiation* and Goethe's *Fairy Tale* at the August 12-16 Conference, made the remarkable observation that the Mystery Drama will be performed on the 99th anniversary of the first performance of the play (August 15, 1910) – three cycles of 33 years! She noted that Steiner wrote his first mystery drama 21 years after reading Goethe's *Fairy Tale* and that his drama is based on it. Barbara handed out the beautiful brochures for the conference and told about the preparations for it. **(continued on next page)**

September will bring Michaelmas festivities and Ray Manacas shared some thoughts about Michaelmas and its importance. This will be followed by the Annual General Meeting October 2-4 which will be entitled "Creating Living Connections: Christian Rosenkreutz and the Social Impulse". Members of the Planning Group provided a Draft of the conference schedule. It was noted that there will be various anthroposophical groups meeting the week prior to this conference as well as the week after it. This year the conference will be open to friends, as well as members of the Society and there will be a talk by Virginia Sease for members only with pink cards required. An alternate lecture will be available from Torin Finser at the same time that is open to all.

Walter Alexander announced that this year is the 100th anniversary of Anthroposophy Coming to America. The St. Mark's Group was founded in 1910. Its members met in Carnegie Hall until Ralph Courtney brought the group to Spring Valley. The New York Branch is planning a celebration in March and Virginia Sease has been invited to speak.

Other items that were discussed or mentioned during the meeting: The national website will soon have a page for each branch in the country. During the AGM in October, The ERC will meet with whomever wants in the Threefold Auditorium during the Saturday lunch break. It was noted that the same questions live in branches all over the country: how to recruit new members, especially the young; how to respond to the issues of the day; daughter movements who seem to have forgotten "the Mother"; how to increase communications; how to bring the many spiritual streams within Anthroposophy into greater harmony and how to reach the Michaelic groups out in the world with whom we share common goals.

As is typical, the most interesting conversations were held among individuals during the snack breaks. I spoke with Youth Movement representative Jordan Walker about why it is that years ago, the youth and the older members worked together and now there seems to be two separate movements within the Society. Jordan said that he hears this question all the time. We both agreed that we need to work together more, as we both have different things to offer each other, each vital to the Society's future.

In 1910 a new impulse in the history of drama was born. Rudolf Steiner brought down to earth "The Portal of Initiation", uniting mystery wisdom with the stage art for the first time since the end of the Kali Yuga, the spiritual dark age of humankind (1899). In one of those rare moments, Rudolf Steiner describes his own process of spiritual investigation with the bringing to earth of this drama. He portrays how, what emerged as his first Mystery Drama (There are a total of four), is a metamorphosis of his inner work with Goethe's fairy tale, "The Green Snake and the Beautiful Lily". It took the great initiate of the 20th century 3x7 years of spiritually working with the tale to have it re-emerge, transformed as "The Portal of Initiation." With this conference we would like to offer the opportunity to deepen our relationship to these two works of art and the mystery of their connection, which lie at the heart of Rudolf Steiner's Spiritual Science, Anthroposophy. Our Saturday performance coincides with the 99th anniversary of the first performance of "The Portal of Initiation" in Munich, German on August 15th, 1910.

What is Anthroposophy?



Anthroposophy, which means “the wisdom of man”, is a spiritual philosophy and path to self-knowledge, which “leads the spiritual in the human being to the spiritual in the universe”, according to its teacher, Rudolf Steiner (1861-1925). Rudolf Steiner was a brilliant “Renaissance man” from Austria who was a philosopher, scientist, artist, playwright, architect, social activist, teacher and meditator, who had a direct perception of the spiritual worlds. Anthroposophy, which is also known as Spiritual Science, teaches, among other things, the laws of reincarnation and Karma. It has a Christ-centered view of world evolution. Steiner founded the School of Spiritual Science, as well as the General Anthroposophical Society, which he described as “a union of people who desire to further the life of the soul – both in the individual and in human society – on the basis of true knowledge of the spiritual world”. In addition to giving over 6,000 lectures most of which have been made into books, he helped to found many initiatives that are still thriving today including: the Waldorf School movement, anthroposophical medicine, biodynamic farming, and Eurythmy. Based on his indications, hundreds of initiatives have developed such as: the Curative education movement, the Camp Hill Villages for the handicapped, Weleda remedies, Dr. Hauschka cosmetics, WALA, True Botanica, Astrosophy, Rhythmical Massage, the Alliance for Childhood, The Christian Community, Anthroposophic Prison Outreach, Lazure painting, Demeter, advancements in architecture, science, social and economic reform (The Threefold Social Order, community banks), mathematics and painting. In addition, there are many publishing houses and libraries dedicated to his works throughout the world.
